Between 2003 and 2009 the Bethlehem Area School District (BASD) entered into 17 derivative financial deals, also known as "swaps."

These swaps were slated to help the BASD fund renovations of its school facilities with taxpayer dollars.

Not only do school districts use swaps to finance projects, but local municipalities do as well.

Quite simply, they were gambling with taxpayer dollars and playing roulette with the financial market.

When the market eventually took a nosedive in late 2008, taxpayer money was flushed away.

The public began receiving news

that these swap deals may have been an unsafe and irresponsible use of taxpayer

That is when I requested a full investigation by the Pennsylvania Auditor General.

These swap transactions, which were anticipated to save BASD millions of dollars, cost the school district and its taxpayers \$57.7 million.

In fact, 107 of 501 school districts in the Commonwealth have initiated swaps. Continued inside

Boscola Introduces Legislation to Protect Taxpayer Dollars

Eighty-six local governments have also entered into these risky deals.

Since the Auditor General's findings, I have taken legislative action and steps to make sure this kind of financial debauchery never happens again.

I have proposed legislation to repeal the Act that allows swaps transactions to occur in Pennsylvania.

Further, the legislation also bans municipal authorities from entering into swap deals that are unsafe.

We must do all we can in Harrisburg to protect taxpayer dollars especially during these uncertain economic times.

If our citizens are required to be responsible taxpayers, school districts and municipalities must be responsible and accountable with your money!

 - Look for the ENERGY STAR® label on home appliances and products.



Protecting our Local Communities from Domestic Violent Offenders

In the State Senate I have introduced legislation entitled *Robin's Law* that will create a statewide registry for Domestic Violence Predators. My bill would require registration for domestic violence predators that individuals could access via the Internet.

Approximately 1.3 million women and 835,000 men are physically assaulted by an intimate partner annually in the United States.

Domestic violence can happen to people of all racial, economic, educational, and religious backgrounds.

Curbing domestic violence must be a priority for our state government in the future.

In June 2005, Robin Shaffer was murdered in Quakertown by her estranged husband who had a prior conviction for attempting to murder his first wife.

The intent of my legislation is to help save the lives of individuals like Robin who may not know that their potential partner is a domestic violence offender.

Other states such as Kansas, Montana, and Oklahoma provide Violent Offender Registries for their residents. We should do the same here in Pennsylvania. Domestic violence is reinforced when abusers are not held responsible for their actions. Creating a statewide registry of Domestic Violence Predators will allow for more accountability.

That is why I am working hard to urge my colleagues in the General Assembly to pass Robin's Law for those who suffer from domestic abuse.

CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE

Pennsylvania's first-in-the-nation Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) is working today to provide quality health care coverage to more than 197,000 previously uninsured Pennsylvania children — a record. Expanded in 2006 toward the goal of covering all uninsured Pennsylvania kids, the program provides "free" or reduced-cost children's coverage based on family income. New income eligibility guidelines will become effective in the spring.

◆ SENIOR CITIZEN PROPERTY TAX & RENT REBATES

Pennsylvania's Property Tax and Rent Rebate (PTRR) program benefits seniors age 65 and older, widows/ widowers age 50 and older and disabled adults 18 and older. The income limit for qualifying homeowners is now \$35,000 and for renters is \$15,000 — with one-half of Social Security not counted in the income calculations. The maximum regular rebate for both homeowners and renters is \$650.

Some senior homeowners are now also qualifying for supplemental rebates up to an added \$325. PTRR applications for the 2009 tax year are now available. If you received a rebate last year, you will automatically receive a new application in the mail. Annual applications are required for the program.

◆ LAW ENSURES ADULT CHILDREN HAVE COVERAGE

Today, students are staying in school longer and new graduates are having a tough time finding work. Thanks to a new law in Pennsylvania, they can continue to receive health coverage on their parents' insurance plan. The new law (Act 4 of 2009) allows eligible adults up to age 30 to remain covered by their parents' health insurance. The eligible adults must be Pennsylvania residents or enrolled as a full-time student at an institution of higher education, unmarried, have no dependents, and are not provided private insurance coverage or enrolled in, or eligible for, government benefits.

- \$3,797,563 Bridge Repair in Stroud & Smithfield Townships and Stroudsburg and East Stroudsburg Boroughs
- \$2,149,192 Resurfacing SR 329 in North Whitehall and Whitehall Townships
- \$1,548,975 Resurfacing SR 412 from I-78 through Hellertown in Northampton County (Work was completed in November by Bracalente Construction, Inc. of Northampton which employs state-of-the-art paving technologies to serve Eastern Pennsylvania)
